Do You Recognize the "Big 5" OEs?

Do not assume that these "intensities" are on the surface and easy to spot!

Some gifted children protect themselves by trying to hide their extreme sensitivity.

They may give the impression that they are impassive or indifferent.

Imaginational

Dramatic, inventive, highly creative. Drawn to fantasy games and stories. May daydream, and have imaginary friends.

Intellectual

Intense curiosity, concentration, and drive to learn. Drawn to problem-solving, puzzles. Driven by a thirst for knowledge. Keen, active minds, and voracious readers.

Emotional

intense feelings, extreme sensitivity, worry or empathy, strong attachments, temper tantrums

Psychomotor

Active, energetic, athletic, fidgety, talks incessantly impulsive, nervous, compulsive, enthusiastic


Sensual

Heightened senses (seeing, smelling, tasting, touching). Drawn to music, language & art. May fuss over certain sounds, clothing, and foods.

Top 10 Things to Know About Gifted Kids

- 1. There is more to gifted children than their intelligence
- 2. They are emotionally very sensitive
- 3. They have a strong sense of right and wrong
- 4. Being gifted does not equal having straight A's in school
- 5. Gifted kids may be atypical learners who seem quirky or eccentric
- 6. Giftedness can be misdiagnosed as ADHD or ADD
- 7. They are very intuitive, with a keen radar sense
- 8. Gifted does not mean perfect
- 9. Gifted kids can be twice-exceptional (both gifted and with a disability)



What Does It Mean to be "Gifted"?

Gifted and talented children are capable of high performance, by virtue of outstanding abilities. They require differentiated educational programs and services beyond those normally provided by the regular school program in order to realize their contribution to self and society. These are children who think and behave in ways that are advanced and different from other children their same age.

A Parent's Guide to Gifted Children (2007)

<u>State of California Definition</u>: Students in a public elementary or secondary school who are identified as possessing *demonstrated or potential* abilities that give evidence of high performance capability, are enrolled in Gifted and Talented Education (GATE).

"High performance capability" is defined by each school district, using one or more of the following categories: intellectual, creative, specific academic subject area, leadership, high achievement, performing & visual arts talent.

There is no federal funding for gifted programming in the USA. California provides partial funding, but gifted programs are not mandated by the state.

ESSA Supports Gifted Students Every Child Succeeds Act (ESSA) of 2015

This new federal law marks the first time that Title I funds may be used to identify and serve gifted students, ensuring that high-ability students from low-income families receive the challenging instruction that they require to achieve their potential.


ESSA also requires states to say how they will use funding to train teachers how to identify high-potential learners and to meet their unique academic needs.

San Diego Unified School District will now be required by law to:

- Collect and report student achievement data for each achievement level (including <u>both</u> advanced & low-performing students)
- Use Title II professional development funding to address the learning needs of <u>all</u> students (now specifically including gifted students).




The Renzulli Model of Giftedness
