- Currently funded through July 31, 2018




Youth Risk Behavior Survey


The YRBS is an anonymous survey, created and overseen by the CDC and administered every other year in SDUSD high schools.

All data is reported collectively as a district, and *not* by individual schools.

In 2015, San Diego Unified School District high school students reported:

- 32% have had sex (ranging from 12% in 9th grade to 52% in 12th grade).
- 59% used a condom during last intercourse.
- 12% reported having had sex between 11-14 years old.
- 12% have been tested for HIV.
- 9.1% of females and 6.4% of males experienced physical dating violence within the past year.
- 7.8% describe themselves as lesbian, gay, or bisexual.
- 11.6% have been harassed due to being perceived as being lesbian, gay, or bisexual.





California Healthy Youth Act Mandated by the State of CA

Comprehensive sexual health and HIV Prevention instruction must be:

- Taught at least once in middle school and at least once in high school (grades 7-12).
- Age-appropriate if taught earlier than grade 7 and instruction must align with the general provisions (§§51930-2) and may include any of the general topics (§§51933-4).
- · Medically accurate, objective, and unbiased.
- Appropriate for use with pupils of all races, genders, sexual orientations, and ethnic and cultural backgrounds, pupils with disabilities, and English learners.

CA Education Code §§51930-9

New Required Topics

- Sexuality is a normal part of human development.
- Develop healthy attitudes concerning adolescent development, body image, gender, and sexual orientation.
- Affirmatively recognize different sexual orientations and provide examples of same-sex relationships.
- HIV-positive individuals successfully treated with antiretrovirals have normal life expectancies.
- Decrease risk of HIV transmission by decreasing needle use and needle sharing.
- Discuss all legally available pregnancy outcomes, including parenting, adoption, and abortion.
- Information about sexual harassment and assault, relationship violence, and sex trafficking.
- · Information about how to access local sexual healthcare resources and minors' legal rights.

CA Education Code §§51933-4

Parent Notification

- Parent notification letter templates in different languages available on the Staff Portal page of our: www.sandiegounified.org/SHEP.
- We recommend including this letter in all registration/enrollment packets.
- Parents/guardians must be notified at the beginning of the school year:
 - Comprehensive sexual health and HIV prevention instruction will be taking place.
 - Curriculum materials are available for inspection.
 - · They may excuse their child from instruction by providing a written request to the school.
- All incoming students throughout the school year must be notified.
- If instruction is arranged after the beginning of the school year, parents/guardians must be notified at least 14 days prior to instruction.

CA Education Code §§51937-9

Additional Parent/Guardian Rights

Previewing Materials	Excusing Child from Instruction
 Instructional materials must be made "available for inspection." May hold Parent Preview event. And/or instruct parents to contact teacher to review materials. Resources for previews available by contacting us or on our website. 	 "In order to excuse their child they must state their request in writing to the school." Hand-written and signed note to teacher No permission slips or anti-permission slips "Passive consent" – if no note from parent then the student receives the instruction

CA Education Code §51938

Rights, Respect, Responsibility

- Advocates for Youth's curriculum is based on the belief that:
 - Youth have the right to honest sexual health information and equitable opportunities to reach their full potential.
 - Youth deserve respect and to have their experiences be valued.
 - Society has the responsibility to provide young people with all of the tools they need to safeguard their sexual health.
 - Young people have the responsibility to protect themselves.
 - Aligns with National Sexuality Education Standards and CA Ed Code.



Curriculum Overview



- 10 lessons, 50 minutes each
- Taught by trained classroom instructors
- Activity and skills-based instruction
- Homework includes parent/trusted-adult communication activities
- Taught in grades 6, 8, and high school Biology (typically)
- Additional one-hour lessons in grades 9, 11, 12

Talking to Parents about Teaching LGBTQ Material

- 1. We have to protect the rights of all of our students to receive a safe and equitable education.
